What Are Non-NM Unit Projects?

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Section 212(i) of the AWSA authorizes the NMISC to fund the NM Unit or any water utilization projects: to meet water supply demands in Catron, Grant, Hidalgo, and Luna Counties

using funds in the NM Unit Fund

in consultation with SWNM Water Study Group or its successor (now the Water Trust Board).



Non-NM Unit Projects are often referred to as non-diversion projects. The NM Unit Project was a proposed diversion project with off-stream storage.



No deadline in the Act to fund such projects

Previous Non-NM Unit Project Process



2010-2014: NMISC developed a two-tier process to screen and evaluate 45 local stakeholders' proposals



2014-2016: NMISC allocated \$9.1 million to 16 projects



Only 70% of \$9.1 million spent



8 projects complete, 6 projects on hold or not operational, 2 projects abandoned




In 2024 NMISC allowed 3 grantees to reallocate the remaining portion of their prior allocation to new projects

Previous Non-NM Unit Project Challenges

Projects submitted were not "shovel ready" as specified in the funding opportunity	Fiscal agent needed because grantee not eligible to receive state funds	Delays related federal environmental clearance (for work in federal lands)	Necessary permits from federal/state permitting agencies not acquired by grantees
Necessary easements, access agreements, etc. not acquired by grantees	Grantee did not provide sufficient documentation to the NMISC for execution of a funding agreement or an amendment	Grantee did not have in-house resources to implement the project	Grantee's prolonged third- party contracting process (did not have Certified Procurement Officer, engineer's contract had expired, received no proposals, etc.)
	Grantee encountered technical issues during design and/or construction	Grantee did not provide sufficient documentation to the NMISC for payment purposes	F
